

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


**Test Circuit 1 Avalanche Capability**








**Test Circuit 2 Switching Time**




**Test Circuit 3 Gate Charge**






TRANSIENT THERMAL RESISTANCE vs. PULSE WIDTH




FORWARD TRANSFER ADMITTANCE vs. DRAIN CURRENT




DRAIN TO SOURCE ON-STATE RESISTANCE vs. GATE TO SOURCE VOLTAGE









DRAIN TO SOURCE ON-STATE RESISTANCE vs. DRAIN CURRENT




GATE TO SOURCE CUTOFF VOLTAGE vs. CHANNEL TEMPERATURE






SINGLE AVALANCHE ENERGY vs. STARTING CHANNEL TEMPERATURE




SINGLE AVALANCHE CURRENT vs. INDUCTIVE LOAD




PACKAGE DRAWING (Unit: mm)

**Remark** Strong electric field, when exposed to this device, can cause destruction of the gate oxide and ultimately degrade the device operation. Steps must be taken to stop generation of static electricity as much as possible, and quickly dissipate it once, when it has occurred.

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
